See Our Renewable Resources in Action at Hydro Park

Our community's beautiful Hydro Park features kiosks that now display real-time power production data for all seven of Kaukauna Utilities' hydroelectric facilities, as well as the Kaukauna High School wind turbine and the photovoltaic (PV) solar projects at City Hall and the Kaukauna Fire Department. Electronics Recycling

Kaukauna Utilities and the City of Kaukauna collected over 31,000 pounds of material at our Spring 2019 electronic recycling event. The effort keeps these items out of landfills and ensures they are responsibly recycled.

After the Storm: Paying it Forward

After significant storm damage to Kaukauna Utilities' system on July 20, we called on fellow Public Power utility crews from Sturgeon Bay and New Holstein for assistance. With their help, we completed clean-up and power restoration. Kaukauna Utilities then paid it forward, sending two of our own line workers to other stormstricken communities in western Wisconsin.

KEEPING COSTS DOWN

Lower Rates

Kaukauna Utilities reduced our electric rates by 3.5% in 2019, thanks in large part to the highly cost-effective hydro resources that power up to 30% of our customers' energy needs. The Public Service Commission of Wisconsin's approval of the new rates this year brought to a close a rate adjustment process that began in late 2017 following

the receivership and sale of Appleton Coated, which had been Kaukauna Utilities' largest customer by far.


Hydro Facilities Deliver Value

Kaukauna Utilities' investment in local hydro resources worked to significantly offset the impacts of the lost revenue from Appleton Coated. Now that our utility provides less power to the mill, our other customers receive a greater percentage of the low-cost local power that we produce at Kaukauna Utilities' seven local hydro facilities along the Fox River.



Boosting the Bottom Line

In 2018, Kaukauna Utilities helped customers reduce energy waste by more than 10.5 million kilowatt-hours (kWh) – that's enough electricity to power 12,500 homes for a month. We also provided water conservation incentives including customer rebates for water-saving faucets, toilets, automatic clothes washers and dishwashers.

Advanced Meter Installation Continues

Kaukauna Utilities has nearly wrapped up installing advanced meters across our system, with completion anticipated by the end of 2019. Advanced meters allow us to provide more proactive customer service, improve system reliability and operate more efficiently. In the future, the technology will also enable more options for customers to track and make informed decisions about their usage, gain more control over their monthly bills, and more.

New Solar Energy Project

Kaukauna Utilities' warehouse received a grant from our wholesale power supplier, WPPI Energy, for a 78-kilowatt (kW) rooftop solar PV installation. The project was designed and will be installed by Kaukauna Utilities, and it is anticipated to generate most of the energy the warehouse needs.

Smart Energy Provider

Kaukauna Utilities has been recognized by the American Public Power Association as a Smart Energy Provider Utility for our efforts to



incorporate energy efficiencies and sustainability while providing affordable electric service.

Energy Billing: Did You Know?

Most of the costs in your monthly residential electric bill are for energy usage, which is measured and billed in kilowatt-hour (kWh) units of electricity. One kWh powers a 100-kW light bulb for 10 hours.



WATER NEWS

Kaukauna Utilities remains committed to delivering the best quality drinking water. We work vigilantly to adopt new methods for ensuring safety while meeting customer needs.

Water Main Replacements Continue

Each year, we replace water main relays to better serve customers and comply with lead sampling requirements. We consider this a priority. It is our goal to eventually eliminate lead laterals from our system.

Customer-Owned Lead Service Line Replacement

In the interest of public health, Kaukauna Utilities will remove by 2030 all existing lead service water lines. The service line is what delivers water from the utility's water main to the home. Typically, it is most convenient and cost-effective for property owners to replace their private lead service lines at the same time the utility replaces its public lines; however, doing so was not a requirement prior to 2011.

In 2019, the Utility Commission and the City of Kaukauna's Common Council determined it is in the public interest to remove and replace all lead service lines, public or private. The resulting ordinance requires property owners to replace lead service lines connected to utility water lines which were replaced before 2011 and which are not scheduled for utility replacement in the next 10 years.

Each year, about 75 residents will be notified they are required to replace their lead service line.

Kaukauna Utilities will coordinate contractor bids to cost-effectively replace the lines. To help fund the costs, the utility will offer a 10-year loan, to be paid back on the property tax bill. The cost can also be paid in full when the line is replaced. Most projects will be carried out with a trenchless method requiring very little excavation.

Advanced Water Meters

Installation of advanced water meters continues across the Kaukauna Utilities system. We expect to complete this initiative by the end of 2019.

Detecting Water Main Leaks

We log and analyze flow on our water mains overnight, when usage should be very low, to find where repairs are needed. The result: we've reduced leaks by 2%, saving both water and the energy needed for pumping and filtering. The effort helps keep costs down for everyone.
