The next recycling event is scheduled for Sept. 22, 2018.


KEEPING COSTS DOWN

Kaukauna Utilities' investment in local hydropower resources is the greatest factor helping to keep our rates among the lowest in Wisconsin. In addition, a recent change to the federal corporate tax rate is lowering our wholesale electric costs, and our utility passes these savings on to customers. We have also examined our business plan for the next several years and cut back on infrastructure and operational costs where possible.

- Budget billing



Delivering Results

In 2017, Kaukauna Utilities helped customers reduce energy usage by more than 12 million kilowatt-hours – that's enough electricity to power 16,000 homes for a month. We also provided water conservation incentives including customer rebates for water saving faucets, toilets, automatic clothes washers and dishwashers.


ELECTRICITY NEWS

Cost-Effective Hydroelectric Power Benefits Customers

Kaukauna Utilities owns and operates seven hydroelectric facilities along the Fox River. These local, emissions-free facilities are our lowest-cost power supply resource, and the electricity they generate meets approximately 30% of KU customers' total needs, helping significantly to keep bills down for everyone we serve.

Solar Energy Projects

- The **Kaukauna Fire Department** has a new array of solar photovoltaic (PV) panels engineered and installed by Kaukauna Utilities and funded in part by a grant from our power supplier, WPPI Energy. The 90-kilowatt (kW) project is the largest renewable energy application for a municipal building in Wisconsin.
- The Kaukauna Housing Authority, with installation help from Fox Valley Technical College and a grant from WPPI Energy, is now home to a 20-kW PV array located on the roof of its carport.




A Reliable Distribution System

With 183 miles of overhead lines, 142 miles of underground lines and 10 substations, regular maintenance is crucial to the reliability of Kaukauna Utilities electric distribution system. Our electric department completed a number

of capital improvement and preventative maintenance projects to help ensure excellent reliability for customers.

- Continuous capital improvements
- Tree trimming
- Infrared inspection of lines and connections
- Annual substation inspections
- Combined Locks substation upgrades underway
- OO substation upgrades completed





Kaukauna Utilities has been recognized by the American Public Power Association as a Diamond-Level Reliable Public Power utility. RP3 designation honors utilities that are strongly committed to providing reliable power while also maintaining high standards of safety and efficiency.

Advanced Meter Installation Continues

Kaukauna Utilities is continuing to install advanced meters across its customer base, with water meter completion anticipated in 2019, and electric meter completion expected in early 2020. Advanced meters allow utilities to provide more proactive customer service, improve system reliability and operate more efficiently. In the future, the technology will also enable more options for customers to track and make informed decisions about their usage, gain more control over their monthly bills, and more.

WATER NEWS

Kaukauna's municipal water system includes five groundwater wells throughout the city, with three iron filters to remove both iron and radium. Kaukauna's two water towers each hold up to 500,000 gallons of water and supply over 6,200 residents with water. We regularly carry out projects to ensure that we can continue meeting all regulatory requirements while providing reliable, clean water service at competitive rates.

Water Filter Plants

With #8 filter plant now completed and two other rebuild/ replacement projects completed a few years ago, we expect decades of service without disruption from our water filter plants. These filter plants have the capacity to treat up to two million gallons of water per day.

Water Main Replacements Continue

Each year we concentrate on replacing water main relays where lead laterals still exist. We remain in compliance with our lead sampling and consider this a priority, therefore it is our goal to eventually eliminate lead laterals from our distribution system. New water lines are designed to reduce the chance of water line breaks and have life expectancy of 50+ years.

Detecting Leaks, Avoiding Waste

We are continuing our ongoing efforts using leak detector technology to find and repair water leaks in our system.

Addressing leaks helps Kaukauna Utilities avoid wasting not only water, but also the energy required to pump and filter the water we deliver.

Water Tower Celebrates Legacy

Kaukauna has long been known as the Electric City because of our ability to harness the Fox River to power local homes and businesses. After a recent inspection required by the Department of Natural Resources revealed that the industrial site water tower needed repainting to address rusted areas, the structure was repainted to proudly celebrate our roots with new "Electric City" graphics.
